# CHANGES TO ASSESSMENT POLICIES FOR YEAR 9


### • LATE PENALTIES:

- It is the student's responsibility to submit ALL assessment tasks on time (pg 14 Assessment Handbook).
- If a task is to be handed up in the lesson, it must be PRINTED and ready to submit at the beginning of the lesson, or a 5% late penalty will apply.
- If a task is submitted after the due date then a 20% Penalty of the student's raw marks will be deducted each day, including weekends. A new day begins at 3:30pm.
- Failure of electronic equipment or loss of information through hard disk / memory stick failure does not warrant an extension. Nor may this be used as an excuse for non-completion of a task. If following these types of technology problems a task is late then the usual penalties outlined above will apply.
- If an in-class test/task is missed, it will be completed in the next lesson for that class. Documentation must be supplied explaining the absence.

# ACADEMIC INTEGRITY- PLAGIARISM AND ORGINALITY

- ACADEMIC INTEGRITY PLAGIARISM AND ORIGINALITY:
- Students must ensure they are not guilty of any incidents of plagiarism, either accidental or deliberate. Such acts may result in either a penalty applying to that part of a task where plagiarism is found, or a zero mark being awarded for the whole task. (pg 16 Assessment Handbook)

- COLO:
- Students attending Colo who have assessment tasks due during their time away from the college will be granted an extension of time to complete the task.



### YEAR 9 GOALS: LITERACY

- Summarising frequently with homework tasks, students will need to be able to read a text and then summarise the key points from it.
- To assist students to do this, students need to highlight key words and statements in the text as they read it. When they have finished highlighting they can then re-look over the text and see the main points, ready to use in a summary.
- Use the Cornell note taking



### READ CONSISTENTLY

- One of the easiest things you can do to improve literacy is to read - <u>even just 10 minutes in a study session or before</u> <u>bed will help.</u>
- <u>Choose texts to read that are at or a little below your</u> <u>current reading level.</u>
- Always find books of interest to them and remember it doesn't matter if <u>a Year 9 student only wants to read</u> <u>magazines about soccer – they are still reading and that is</u> <u>what is important.</u>
- Try graphic novels or similar things that have illustrations and less text. Be sure to use graphic novels specifically young adults.
