- In Year 9 we are introducing a writing initiative to refine and further develop writing.






WHAT IS IT?

AN ATTEMPT TO FOCUS ALL OF OUR ATTENTION YEAR 9 ACHIEVING BETTER WRITING.

WHY DO THIS?

How students can write and express themselves is a game changer.

Success in learning outcomes is often demonstrated by how students can express and communicate themselves in writing.







HOW?

- Year 9 teachers will be helping students to focus on this in class.
- Assessments will require to consider the quality of what students have written.
- Students will be practising good writing that clearly delivers the intended message.





HOW?

The long term goal is better writing which results in better success at school.

Think of writing as part of the essential tools students need both now and later.

ASSESSMENT POLICIES

• LATE PENALTIES:

- It is the student's responsibility to submit ALL assessment tasks on time (pg 14 Assessment Handbook).
- If a task is to be handed up in the lesson, it must be PRINTED and ready to submit at the beginning of the lesson, or a 5% late penalty will apply.
- If a task is submitted after the due date then a 20% Penalty of the student's raw marks will be deducted each day, including weekends. A new day begins at 3:30pm.
- Failure of electronic equipment or loss of information through hard disk / memory stick failure does not warrant an extension. Nor may this be used as an excuse for non-completion of a task. If following these types of technology problems a task is late then the usual penalties outlined above will apply.
- If an in-class test/task is missed, it will be completed in the next lesson for that class. Documentation must be supplied explaining the absence.

ACADEMIC INTEGRITY- PLAGIARISM AND ORGINALITY

- ACADEMIC INTEGRITY PLAGIARISM AND ORIGINALITY:
- Students must ensure they are not guilty of any incidents of plagiarism, either accidental or deliberate. Such acts may result in either a penalty applying to that part of a task where plagiarism is found, or a zero mark being awarded for the whole task. (pg 16 Assessment Handbook)

- COLO:
- Students attending Colo who have assessment tasks due during their time away from the college will be granted an extension of time to complete the task.
